We were notified about two adult cats at the shelter who had an upper respiratory infection (URI). That's basically a cat cold. In a shelter situation, a URI is easily passed around the room. Cats and kittens in the shelter are more susceptible as they are stressed and that weakens their immune system. These two were on the danger list because of their URI.





When we got the call that they had 3 hours before euthanasia, we sprung

into action, desperately searching for a foster home. Even a temporary foster home to get them out of the shelter until we could find a more permanent foster. Our social media pages

became super heated, pleading for someone to get these cats to safety.

They didn't deserve death just because they had a cold.

We couldn't have been more overjoyed when we heard Zac and Madalyn would take them as temporary fosters to get them to safety and on the mend! That was only the first step and they were out of the shelter because someone stepped up to temporarily foster until another more permanent foster home could be found. Well, that has happened for



one of them. She is now happy and alive in her new foster home because someone stepped up to become the temporary bridge to a new foster or permanent home.

ways to communicate with the volunteers to get them to come out and help. Volunteering has given me the opportunity to help save the lives of so many precious fur babies and they all hold a special place in my heart. I enjoy spending my weekends making their time at Petco Clinic as comfortable as possible as well as helping them find their forever homes.

Ingredients: 10 oz canned salmon undrained 1 egg beaten 2 cups whole wheat flour

~Heat oven to 350°. Pulse 10 oz /canned salmon (undrained) in a food processor and chop as finely as possible.

~In a stand mixer, combine salmon, 1 egg (beaten), and 2 cups whole wheat flour until dough

forms. If dough is too dry, add up to 1/3 cup water. If dough is too wet or sticky, add a bit more flour. Dough should be tacky but not sticky.

- ~Roll out dough on a floured surface until about 1/4 inch thick. Use a 3/4-inch cookie cutter in the shape of your choice to create your treats.
- ~Place treats on a parchment-lined baking sheet and bake at 350° for about 20 minutes. When they're slightly browned and crunchy, they're done.

~Allow to cool before serving.

~Store in an airtight container for up to 2 weeks.

Cat Acne: Yes, It Exists and Yes, You Can Treat It

Has your cat ever experienced pimples or blackheads on her mouth, face or other parts of her body? Yes, cat acne is a thing, and your cats don't have to be teenagers to experience cat acne either.

First, what is cat acne?

Cat acne is the common name for an idiopathic (meaning we don't know why it occurs) disorder, which is known histologically as follicular keratosis. It is very common in cats and can occur at any age and any breed.

What are the symptoms of cat acne?

Cat acne, or <u>feline acne</u>, is a cosmetic disease, but it usually requires lifelong on-again, off-again symptomatic treatment to keep it under control. Most of the time there are just asymptomatic comedones (blackheads) on the chin, lower lip, and sometimes on the upper lip. There is the possibility that pustules will form if a secondary infection is present. In very severe cases, the skin around the chin can become very thick and edematous (swollen) and even scarred from repeated infections and treatments.

Don't confuse cat acne with other diseases such as mange (demodicosis), ringworm (dermatophytosis), contact dermatitis (such as an allergy to plastic food bowls), Malassezia (a type of yeast) dermatitis or eosinophilic granuloma complex. It is important to rule all these diseases out with the appropriate testing by a veterinarian,

Cat acne treatment

Mild cases of feline acne (non-infected) can be treated with human acne pads or medicated shampoos. If the area is infected, then the treatment involves systemic antibiotics for two to six weeks.

You can also gently cleanse with an antibiotic soap, hydrogen peroxide, diluted iodine (Betadine), diluted Epsom salts and topical vitamin A. In more severe cases of cat acne, cleanse the skin with an ointment or gel containing benzoyl peroxide (OxyDex) or chlorhexidine. To curtail dermatitis issues, you can switch from a plastic bowl to a ceramic, stainless steel or glass bowl. Plastic food bowls are porous and can trap bacteria, which then transfers to the cat's chin.

What causes cat acne?

We don't know the exact cause of cat acne. There are several possible causes of feline acne, including stress, poor grooming by human companions or by the cat herself, over-active sebaceous glands and food allergies. However you proceed, always consult your veterinarian before treating your pet at home, and good luck.

Page 5 17 Health Benefits of Owning a Cat

When you think of things that can help you increase your health, you don't often think about cats. However, health professionals and researchers are finding that owning a cat can actually benefit your health. You can enjoy a number of benefits from cat ownership. Here are some of the benefits associated with owning a cat:

Lower risk of cardiovascular disease: A study from the University of Minnesota found that people without cats were between 30 and 40 percent more likely to die of cardiovascular disease than cat owners. According to the study, dog owners didn't reap the same benefits as cat owners.

Reduce risk of heart attack: Not only will your entire cardiovascular

system thank you, but you can reduce the chance that you die suddenly due to heart attack if you own a cat.

Improve your immune function: The feelings you get related to the cat can help you give your immune system a boost. Cats often know when you are ill, and can provide you with comfort, helping you get better while boosting your immune system.

Decrease chance of developing allergies: There are some studies that newborns that live with animals, specifically cats and dogs, are more likely to avoid developing allergies. Being used to them from an early age triggers immunity.

Help prevent asthma in children: If you have kids, owning a cat and exposing your kids to cats might help them to avoid developing asthma. Early and regular contact with cats can help your children avoid a number of respiratory problems.

Reduce blood pressure: Just stroking a cat is calming and lowers blood pressure. Those who own pets, according to a State University of New York at Buffalo study, are more likely to have lower blood pressure than those who do not have pets.

Lower triglycerides: Some studies indicate that if you have a cat, you can lower your triglycerides and boost your health by owning a cat. While you should probably still exercise and eat better, owning a cat can help the process along.

Lower cholesterol: A 2006 study in Canada showed that owning a cat was actually more effective at lowering cholesterol than the medications designed to do that same thing. Indeed, you could save money on meds and improve your health, possibly, by becoming a cat owner.

Reduced risk of stroke: A study at Minnesota University found that cat owners could reduce their risk of stroke by 1/3. The idea that you can help reduce the chances of having a stroke, thanks to a cat, is one reason to consider cat ownership.

Reduce stress: Having a cat has many psychological benefits, and one of those is relieving stress. Being able to care for an animal, or having a cat snuggle with you, can help you feel better, and reduce your level of stress.

Reduce anxiety: Petting a cat is calming, as are other aspects of caring for cats. When you are concerned with caring for another creature, it can help you take your mind off your worries. Additionally, the presence of a cat that will snuggle with you can help you calm yourself as your enjoy the unconditional love of a cat.

Improve your mood: Owning a cat can help you feel better in general, boosting your mood. If you are looking to see mood improvement, a cat can help with that.

Help with depression: While a cat may not actually "cure" depression, it can help take your mind off your problems, and focus on something else. The love a cat offers can also be soothing to the mind. If you are depressed, cat companionship can help you in your battle.

Help with autism: Those with autism have a hard time communicating in the same way that others do. Having a cat can actually help in these cases. There have been instances where cats have been instrumental in therapy for autistic children. Other developmental disorders can be helped with exposure to cats as well.



Reduced loneliness: Cat companionship can help those who are lonely feel a connection with another life. Just having a cat to come home to and spend time with can help those who are single, or widowed.

Fewer health care visits: This includes visits to the doctor, and hospital visits. Studies have also shown that nursing homes that allow cats as part of the therapy for patients have lower medication costs than facilities that do not make use of cats as part of therapy.

Longer life: Cats provide a number of benefits that can lead to a longer life, including a form of social interaction. So, if you want to be healthy and live a little bit longer, consider owning a cat.
